

THE "QUIET" SEASON

The busy winter season has drawn to a close, and with the mild temperatures of Spring and the smell of citrus blossoms in the air, the atmosphere at Canyon Granada and throughout the Coachella Valley is quieting down. Our grounds look terrific, thanks to the good work of our landscape maintenance crew, our on-site gardener/warrior – Martine, and our Landscape Committee who oversees improvements to our grounds.

As we prepare for intense heat here in Palm Springs, here are a few tips to help you protect your property if you will be away for the summer:

- 1. Arrange for your mail and regular deliveries to be stopped or forwarded.
- 2. Arrange for storage of valuables that you won't be taking with you.
- 3. Remove any standing water from fountains or containers on your deck or patio. These can become breeding grounds for mosquitos.
- 4. Remove or cover chairs, furniture and décor on your patio or deck.
- 5. Seal up non-refrigerated products like cereals, grains, boxed foods, baking products, and pet foods to discourage an invasion of bugs or rodents.
- 6. If you will be leaving the refrigerator running while you are gone, toss any food that will spoil. You can keep items like condiments and water in the refrigerator. A working refrigerator that is nearly empty uses more energy, so add bottles of water.
- 7. Provide a key to your unit as well as your contact information to a neighbor or friend who lives nearby.
- 8. Set A/C at a high temperature like 88 or 90. Turning A/C off completely is your choice, but high interior heat can harm artwork, furniture, carpeting, wine, food, etc.
- 9. Flush all toilets and run all faucets.
- 10. Turn off ceiling fans indoors and out.

- 11. Open the doors to the washer and dryer, the dishwasher, and any other appliance that typically seals up. Put a few tablespoons of vegetable oil in the dishwasher and in the garbage disposal so that the seals don't disintegrate in the heat.
- 12. Turn the water heater off.
- 13. Unplug appliances, entertainment units, computers, or anything susceptible to power surges.

MAKING LEMONADE



This season at Canyon Granada, Mother Nature gave us lemons, <u>a lot</u> <u>of lemons</u>, plus a plethora of grapefruit, and oranges. Unfortunately, invasive pests (namely aphids) prescribed that all fruit be removed from 35 citrus trees during early March 2025, what did Canyon Granada do? Making lemonade was certainly one option, along with many other citrus based concoctions. A more altruistic goal was sharing some of this largess with local agencies serving the needs of people who depend on weekly food allotments from food pantries. Thus, a small but mighty contingent of residents consisting of owners, visiting friends, and Winter tenants, got busy picking fruit for donation to these agencies.

A potentially sad story for our trees had a happy ending for the Community Food Bank, Saint Teresa's Church Food Pantry, and the

Boys and Girls Club of Cathedral City. All these food distributing agencies received generous donations of fresh, wholesome citrus from Canyon Granada – about 800 pounds of it to be precise. Our trees have now been treated with a compound designed to make the trees healthier and more resistant to pests for the next growing season. Many thanks to everyone who either picked fruit for their own use, or for donation to these worthy agencies. We will look forward to an abundant new citrus crop next Winter.

Landscape Committee

Phase I of the rock overlay along South Palm Canyon drive was completed in January. This was a big improvement for our community.



Pathway lighting between the 200 & 300 building was fixed and provided additional lighting along the pathway towards the west pool.

At the March HOA Board meeting, three additional landscape projects were approved:

1. Phase II of rock overlay outside the wall at corner of South Palm Canyon drive and Granada and at main entrance.

2. Mulch and irrigation addition to 38 citrus trees.

3. Planting of new trees to increase canopy coverage in preparation for compliance with upcoming state and local water conservation mandates. The new trees will better establish while we are still watering grass. We get credit for the canopy of new trees at maturity so we can plant younger trees now at lower cost. These plantings, at maturity, will bring us close to a mandated 50% coverage goal.

Review of the square footage of turf and canopy coverage at Canyon Granada is ongoing. The Landscape Committee has measured all square footage of turf and determined we currently have 40K sq. ft. of turf, with 17K sq. ft. of canopy or 40% coverage. We should be in good shape to meet a 50% canopy cover requirement without the need to plant major new quantities of trees and shrubs.

Security
